FROM RABBI WEBER

On Rosh Hashanah the Jewish calendar will change from 5768 to 5769. That much we know for sure. But whether *we* will change is something which only *we* can decide.

If we decide not to change, then the New Year will be the Old Year lived over again. And again. And again. Our High Holiday liturgy is filled with prayers asking God to help us *renew* ourselves, rather than simply rerunning old episodes of our lives. But prayers cannot make us change. Our loved ones cannot make us change. Even God cannot make us change. Only *we* can choose to change.

At Temple Rodeph Torah you will see exciting new things this fall. But whether they will affect us and *change* us will depend on our choices. No one else's.

When you come to temple in September you will enter our beautiful new sanctuary. The goal of our new sanctuary is to embrace: to embrace our worshippers, to embrace our tradition and to embrace God. It removes barriers to those in wheelchairs or walkers who will now be able to come to the *bima*, and barriers between worshippers and those leading the service. But whether it will also make it possible for us to embrace each other, our tradition and God is not up to the designers or the contractors. It is up to us.

People say they feel alienated from God, so they don't pray. But praying – communicating with God – is the way to decrease our alienation; it doesn't happen by itself. People say they don't feel connected to Judaism, but to be connected we need to be where Judaism can connect with us. People say they don't come to temple because they don't know anyone, yet all it takes is coming a few times to start recognizing your fellow congregants and having them recognize you. Our new sanctuary invites us to see Judaism differently,

but only *we* can choose to accept this invitation.

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Some of you have already met Cantor Alexander. She is new, too – new to TRT and new to being a cantor. During months of meeting with her and planning our services for the coming year I have seen that she is very excited about being part of our community. She is also very interested in learning our traditions and our melodies as we pray and grow together. But whether she will actually change our way of praying and increase our joy in spiritual expression is not up to her. It is up to us.

Cantor Alexander brings her own ideas and experiences to us, and offers us the opportunity to rethink what our prayers mean. She has a lot to teach us, but that will only happen if we choose to listen to what she is saying to us. While it is warm and reassuring to hear songs sung just the way they were sung for the past 50 years, “reassuring” does not always help us to change. New melodies, new ideas, new approaches... these are the building-blocks of new ways of praying and new ways of thinking. New – like a New Year.

The first formal Jewish prayers were written when Greek philosophy taught that humans were merely playthings for the gods. Our radical idea that we control our own destiny – that our choices, not fate, determine our future – changed the way the whole world relates to God. Sometimes we wish it were not so: it would be easier to say, “the devil made me do it” than to accept responsibility for our behavior. But if we give up our responsibility to choose, we also give up the ability to change: to improve our lives, and to believe that we can make ourselves and our world better next year than it is today.

From our High Holiday liturgy:

Now is the time for turning. The leaves are beginning to turn from green to red to orange. The birds are beginning to turn and are heading once more toward the south. The animals are beginning to turn to storing their food for the winter.

For leaves, birds and animals, turning comes instinctively. But for us, turning does not come so easily. It takes an act of will for us to make a turn. It means breaking old habits. It means admitting that we have been wrong, and this is never easy. It means losing face. It means starting all over again, and this is always painful. It means saying, 'I am sorry.' It means recognizing that we have the ability to change.

These things are terribly hard to do. But unless we turn, we will be trapped forever in yesterday's ways. God, help us to turn from callousness to sensitivity; from hostility to love; from pettiness to purpose; from envy to contentment; from carelessness to discipline; from fear to faith.

Temple Rodeph Torah is filled with changes this fall. May we see each of them as an inspiration; a sign that we, too, can change.

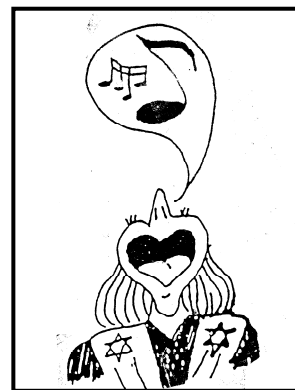
Dear Temple Rodeph Torah,

Notes from the Cantor



Shalom, I am so excited to have been welcomed into the TRT community, and I hope that you will all make an appointment, or stop by my office or drop me an e-mail so I can get to know you. Since I am asking to learn about you, let me tell you a bit about myself. I grew up in Chicago, where my family was, and still are, members of KAM Isaiah Israel congregation. People often ask me if I always wanted to be a cantor and I tell them no, because when I was growing up we did not have a cantor and I did not know what one was. I grew up with the music director and composer Max Janowski, most famously known for his compositions of *Avinu Malkeinu* and *Sim Shalom*. He served KAM Isaiah Israel for over 50 years, until he died when I was 11 years old. It was not until my confirmation service, when I was 16, that I met a cantor. Cantor Deborah Bard quickly learned that I enjoyed singing and was familiar with prayers and the musical traditions of the synagogue, and she started putting me on the *bima*, and I guess they say the rest is history.

Along with the musical traditions of my synagogue, mainly the compositions of Max Janowski, I spent nine summers at Olin Sang Ruby Union Institute, the URJ camp in Wisconsin. This combination of musical styles instilled in me a desire for diversity and balance in worship, and a comfort with very diverse styles of music. During cantorial school I learned that there is often a clash between those who want fancy “performance” music, written with complex arrangements, and those who prefer simpler participatory melodies; and often I was baffled. Both styles were like home for me, and it seemed a clear compromise to provide for both aesthetic desires during worship. Generally, this is my philosophy and the balance I try to find when planning worship ceremonies.

Before attending cantorial school I graduated from New York University, where I studied comparative religion. I have always been interested in religion; it seems like so much of history has been written by different religious struggles, and I was very interested in learning about the similarities and differences between faiths; how people act because of their faith, and what the faith seems to say about practice. This is a continual study and I welcome discussions and look forward to hearing your opinions or experiences with faith, with other faiths, or with choices of action.

As summer is coming to a close and the holidays are upon us, we often reflect over the year or years. Sometimes we are fortunate enough to gather family to us and celebrate our new year together with old thoughts, prayers and music. This year it will be the same and it will be different. I look forward to becoming part of your community, and learning of the traditions close to Temple Rodeph Torah’s heart, but I will also be putting my own stamp on things. I hope you will be open enough to try me out, for even old tunes may sound different in my voice. And I hope, along with sharing a bit of your stories with me, that you will feel open to sharing your feelings about my innovations.

There is one main philosophy I hope to use to guide my cantorate, and that is service to the community. Who are you? Why are you members of this community? What does it give to you? What do you share with it? What are the traditions of this community? Are they still meaningful today? I want to know who you are as individuals, and how you fit into the group of individuals that calls itself the Temple Rodeph Torah community.

EDUCATION

From the Desk of Rabbi Shira Stern:

In my most comforting daydream I see a group of women sitting around a comfortable kitchen table, with oatmeal cookies and tea at hand, fire in the background, catching up on all the latest news or advice as they sit knitting and crocheting their hearts out.

I like when things you dream about actually come to fruition, so it makes me happy to describe our nascent Temple Rodeph Torah Knitting Group. Some of us are veteran knitters, others just beginning, but we provide patterns for all skills levels, wool and needles, all you would need to join in the fun. This wonderful group meets regularly at irregular times, for the purpose of good conversation, fabulous cookies, great guidance and... acts of social justice.

Acts of social justice? For years and years, women have been getting together to quilt wedding blankets for friends, or a baby layette or clothes for a family in dire need. And so we have taken on a similar task, to knit for the needy and create caps for those undergoing chemotherapy. There is a new basket in our TRT entryway: along with birthday supplies for children in Monmouth County and food for the Asbury Park Soup Kitchen, we now have one overflowing with mittens, scarves and caps to share with the Hebrew Union College soup kitchen in New York and the Cancer Center of New Jersey at the Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital.

Being a part of this knitting group is much like envisioning a great religious school. Ideally, a temple's religious school should be a place where students come for good conversation about all things Jewish, fabulous snacks, great guidance from teachers, clergy and other students, all the while doing acts of social justice. This past year we introduced a new principal, some new teachers, a year-long "Go Green" theme and snacks to keep up energy levels. We emphasized the connection between just book learning and acting justly, between *knowing* Jewish and *doing* Jewish. To reinforce the message, 75 of us marched together up Fifth Avenue in June's Israel Day Parade.

This year we will continue the theme of *tzedakah*: literally, acts that bring justice and righteousness in the world. *Tzedakah* is not only about bringing in change for class, but changing the world we live in. Most important, it is about empowering our children with the "how-to" to make a real difference in *their* world, so they can begin to feel responsible as educated, moral and ethical human beings. We need to prepare them to know what it will take to become a Jew in the 21st century.

We hope you will partner with us as we start the new school year. Continue to be a role model for your kids: join us when we study - see the newsletter for information about Adult Education. Join us when we act justly when we volunteer at the soup kitchen, remind your children to bring in weekly *keren ami* donations and food and toys for our holiday charity drives.

Do you knit? Join us when we knit in the evening (check the office and TRT Flash for details), or join us on selected Sunday mornings when you carpool your kids.

My real fantasy is a dream that we all do this together. Help make my dream come true.

I am looking forward to seeing you as we begin a New Year at TRT.

ISRAEL SCHOLARSHIP INFORMATION

The Education Committee believes it is important that our Jewish teenagers have the opportunity to experience a trip to Israel. A trip to Israel is one of the best ways for teens to explore their Jewish heritage, strengthen their Jewish identity, and make a permanent connection to Judaism.

We would like to remind the congregation about the Israel Scholarship Fund. The money that accumulates in this fund is used to provide financial support to any student either in the confirmation program or who has been confirmed, for participation in an approved youth trip to Israel. Contributions to the Israel Scholarship Fund can be for any amount, and are a wonderful way to remember a birthday, graduation, Bar/Bat Mitzvah, Confirmation, or any other special occasion.

Who is eligible for an Israel Scholarship?

Any student presently in the confirmation program or any student who has been confirmed, up through and including the summer after 12th grade, can receive assistance from the Israel Scholarship Fund. The scholarship is not need-based; it is a merit scholarship awarded to any eligible student who is going on an approved youth trip to Israel.

When should you make your request for a scholarship?

A minimum of two months before the student's departure to Israel, a request should be made in writing to the Education Committee. Please provide documentation of the student's enrollment in an Israel trip program.

How much money is awarded?

Money in the Israel Scholarship Fund will be equally divided among all eligible students traveling to Israel that year. The amount of money will not exceed \$1,000 per student. The amount given to each student is based on the amount of money in the fund as of May 31 and will be distributed in June.

The Education Committee looks forward to the time when many of our confirmation students travel to Israel with the help of the Israel Scholarship Fund. We appreciate the congregation's generosity in considering the Israel Scholarship Fund when making a donation to the temple.

ADULT EDUCATION

Temple Rodeph Torah participates in Reform Judaism's nationwide Adult Education Program, *KEVA*. This program recognizes individuals who show a dedication to Jewish study and learning through their participation in Adult Education courses.

Three milestones mark the path to a *KEVA* award: at 50 hours of study, our congregation will present a certificate honoring each student. At 100 hours of study, a certificate will be presented to the students by the Union for Reform Judaism, and the students will be recognized nationwide for their achievement. And when an Adult Education student completes 365 hours of study they receive the URJ's highest award, *CHAVER KEVA*. To date, more than 100 members of Temple Rodeph Torah have received the *KEVA* award, and 16 have been granted the *CHAVER KEVA* award.

Torah Today

A Brief Summary of Each Week's Torah Portion

Shabbat 8/1-2

Parashat Masa'ei, Numbers 33:1-36:13

Summary by Bruce Cooper

On the day after the Passover offering, the Israelites set out boldly in full view of the Egyptians, who were burying their dead first-born. Moses records, and the text recounts, each leg of the Israelite's wanderings. In the fortieth year, shortly after the death of Aaron, Adonai instructs Moses to tell the people to enter Canaan and take possession of it. They are to destroy all of the Canaanites' molten images and cult places.

Adonai then describes to Moses the boundaries of the land given to the Israelites, and explains that it is to be divided among the tribes by lot in proportion to their size. Moses resolves certain questions on the inheritance of lands, so that the lands assigned to each tribe will remain intact. From their apportionment the tribes are to cede land for 48 towns in which the Levites will reside. Of these 48 towns, six are to be specially designated as towns of refuge, where a person who inadvertently causes the death of another will be protected from vengeance until they are judged.

Shabbat 8/8-9

Parashat Devarim, Deuteronomy 1:1-3:22

Summary by Jill Finkelstein

Moses tells the Israelites that God has decided that they have done enough wandering, and it is now time to enter the land of Israel which God promised them. Moses reminds the people of their history: because there were too many of them to handle, he had picked chiefs of each tribe. He then sent 12 men to seek out the best route to the land before the others were to enter. However, when they returned, the Israelites did not want to enter the land because they feared the Amorites. God became angry that the people did not have faith, and so God punished them and would not let the older generation, including Moses, enter the land of Israel. So the Israelites wandered around some more until the older generation died out. They had to pass through the territories of some other tribes. When they reached Israel, Moses divided up the land for the Israelite tribes and explained to Joshua how to handle strangers passing through the land.

Shabbat 8/15-16

Parashat Ve'etchanan, Deuteronomy 3:23-7:11

Summary by Marge Stevens

God would not let Moses cross the Jordan but told him to give Joshua instructions to lead the Jews to the promised land. Moses, commanded by God, instructed the Jews to observe, study and abide by the Covenant with God, recognize there is only one God and teach these rules to their children. Failure to abide by the rules would cause destruction while observing them would bring lasting good and survival.

Shabbat 8/22-23

Parashat Ekev, Deuteronomy 7:12-11:25

Summary by Maxine Perlman

God tells the people what will happen if they observe the commandments and laws of the Torah: most important, God will maintain the covenant that was made with our ancestors. God will make the people and their livestock fruitful and healthy, and will protect the people while they dislodge those nations who worship other gods from the land promised to us. God cautions them not to forget the commandments when they are prosperous, so God will not be provoked to anger against them as happened in the desert. "Love, therefore, Adonai your God, and always keep God's charge, God's laws, God's rules and God's commandments."

Shabbat 8/29-30

Parashat Re'eh, Deuteronomy 11:26-16:17

Summary by Bonnie Sugarman

God provides instructions for the Israelites as to how to live their lives once they take possession of Canaan. These rules include destroying the Canaanite idols and their sites of worship, and establishing

their own temples only in God's specified places. There is strict prohibition against following prophets of other gods, and even if it is a relative, you are required to put such a person to death, along with his converts, their possessions and their livestock. There are laws regarding the animals that may and may not be eaten (later to be the basis of *kashrut*), as well as rules concerning the remission of debts, prohibition on extending loans to other Israelites, and giving to the needy. Finally, there are instructions for observance of Passover, Shavuot and Sukkot.

Shabbat 9/5-6 *Parashat Shofetim, Deuteronomy 16:18-21:9* Summary by Ken Tedoff

This Torah portion consists of three main themes — justice within the community, election of a King, and behavior during wartime. Its two lesser themes are the coming of a prophet and making a sacrifice for an unresolved murder. A few of the main points are as follows: in relation to justice we should not bear false witness against someone; it takes at least two witnesses to convict a person of a transgression; we should protect a person who accidentally kills but not one who purposely kills; and we should abide by the decision of a judge on any matter put before him. In relation to picking a King it states that the King should be of our brethren, should commit his life to study, and should not consider himself above the community. Before going to war with someone we should offer peace. If we must go to war we should not kill women and children nor destroy the countryside that could provide for us. We should not take the ways of those we conquer but stay true to our laws.

Shabbat 9/12-13 *Parashat Ki Tetze, Deuteronomy 21:10-25:19* Summary by Peter Sugarman

This section contains a series of diverse laws intended to impose a moral fabric on the Jewish society, so Israel may be a worthy people for God and deserve their special status as God's people. For example, laws cover topics including a disloyal and defiant child, burial of a criminal, marriage and sexual behavior, physical hygiene, and helping the weak. Other laws try to preserve the intent of creation by avoiding unnatural mixes, such as a man wearing a woman's clothing.

Shabbat 9/19-20 *Parashat Ki Tavo, Deuteronomy 26:1-29:8* Summary by Gloria and Ed Russin

Prior to the Israelites entering the promised land, Moses reminds the Israelites of how God guided them through 40 years in the wilderness, and of the covenant that they entered into with God. Moses tells the Israelites that they will prosper so long as they observe all of the commandments and laws given to them by God. Should they not observe God's commandments they will suffer many curses and ultimately be destroyed.

Shabbat 9/26-27 *Parashat Nitzavim, Deuteronomy 29:9-30:20* Summary by Helene Cooper

In this portion Moses tells all of Israel what will become of them should they turn from the Teachings of Adonai. He assures them that, though the curses are thorough and harsh, Adonai will restore them to God's blessings if they return to God's Teachings. He tells them that these Teachings are right there for them always and available to all of them. With this Moses presents the Israelites with the choice between being blessed and loving Adonai or being cursed for not.

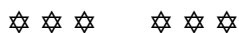
