## FROM RABBI WEBER

**H**ave you ever worn a Jewish star, or a *chai*, or a *mezuzah* around your neck, so others could see it? If you have, thank Israel.

Have you ever put a *mezuzah* on the door of your house – not way up in the top corner, but right at eye level, so everyone who comes into your home sees it? If you have, thank Israel.

Have you ever stood up to an anti-Semitic comment, or taught your children or grandchildren to be proud of who they are as Jews and not to let others speak badly about Judaism? If you have, thank Israel.

Has your heart ever swelled with pride when you saw a blue-and-white flag with a Jewish star standing proudly alongside the flags of the other nations on this planet? If you have, thank Israel.

Even if you have never been to Israel, its existence has changed your life as a Jew and as a Jewish family. Nothing in the past 2,000 years has done more to make us proud of being Jewish. Yes, it is amazing to see Israel represented at the United Nations, or to see Israeli leaders being well received in the White House. But when Israel stands up to its enemies, it teaches us to stand up for what we believe in, too.

Before 1967 – the year of the Six Day War – most American Jews were very private about our Judaism. We went to temple, but even our temples were designed to look more like modern art museums than anything too overtly Jewish. If we wore a *mezuzah*, we wore it inside our clothing; after all, there was no sense being too obvious about it. And the instructions my father was given in school were simple: if someone says something anti-Semitic, walk away. There was no reason to fight over it, and it would be better for everyone if the insult was simply ignored.

Then everything changed. We Jews, who had always identified with the Woody Allen-style *nebbish* who wore thick glasses, could not defend himself and whined about everything, suddenly had a new role model: the Israeli soldier. Young, strong, proud, gorgeous (male and female!) and... victorious. While succeeding years have shown the problems which Israel inherited with its breathtaking conquest of the Golan Heights, the West Bank,

Gaza and the Sinai, the war itself accomplished something which no religious school class or sermon could ever achieve: Jews became proud to be Jewish.

With that pride, we began to ask ourselves a new question: instead of wondering if we would *survive* – an obvious question after the Holocaust – we started thinking about how we could *thrive*. And we began to act like people who *belong* here, rather than like outsiders hoping not to be noticed. Out came the Jewish stars and the *chai* jewelry. Out came the big, colorful, hand-crafted *mezuzzot* for our doors. Out came Jon Stewart and Matisyahu. Out came Birthright Israel and JDate. Out came the crowds at the Israel Day Parades in major cities around the country. Like the civil rights movement before us and the gay pride movement after us, we stood up and *demanded* acceptance, thanks to Israel.

Now it is our turn, because Israel needs our help.

As I write this, missiles are falling on Israeli towns. I assume the missiles will be falling on Israeli towns when you read this, too. Much has been made of the inaccuracy of the missiles, and how there have been “only a few casualties” from them; in fact, this has been used to claim that *Israel* is the guilty party when it sends in helicopter gunships to destroy the missile launchers. The argument that Israel has no right to defend itself if the people shooting at its citizens can’t aim well is beyond absurd, yet it is being heard around the world. And since Hamas places its missile launchers in the middle of housing projects, they guarantee a perfect “photo-op” of an injured child whenever Israel tries to stop the attacks on its own children.

It has been said that if the Palestinians laid down their weapons tomorrow, there would be no more war; if Israel laid down its weapons tomorrow, there would be no more Israel. No other nation on the planet has to try to prove that it deserves to exist, sixty years after its birth. Who has the courage to stand up for Israel?

I hope we do. We owe it to her for all she has done for us. We owe it to her for all she has done for the Jewish people, wherever we live. *We* will stand up for Israel.

In Rabbi Stern’s column this month you will find the details about TRT’s participation in the Salute to Israel Parade which takes place on Sunday, June 1<sup>st</sup>, in New York City. Tens of thousands of people – Jewish and non-Jewish – will march to show our support for Israel, for Israelis and for the 60<sup>th</sup> birthday of the only democracy in the Middle East. Please join us: walk if you can walk, or sit in the reviewing area if you cannot walk. Either way, it is time to stand up for Israel.

You will be so proud you did.

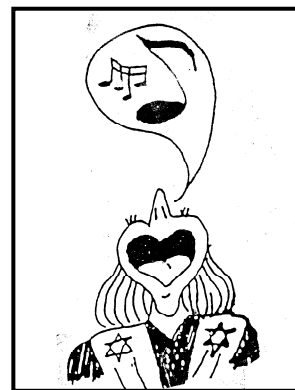

## EDUCATION

### From the Desk of Rabbi Shira Stern:

Ever watch a parade and wonder, “Could I do that?” Nothing matches the pageantry and the excitement of standing in the middle of Fifth Avenue, walking the WRONG WAY up town with flags flying, bands playing, singers singing and dancers in full dress uniforms doing the *hora*. And telling you about it is a little like trying to describe what chocolate tastes like; you really have to experience it for yourself.

This year, on June 1<sup>st</sup>, Temple Rodeph Torah is going to be right in the middle of the Salute to the 60<sup>th</sup> Birthday of Israel Parade, in costume around our “Go Green – Go Israel” theme. We will have marchers and an organized spectator area for those who want to cheer us on. We will have banners and posters and hand puppets and streamers (all recyclable or bio-degradable). And of course, we will have T-shirts with the parade logo on the front and our temple name on the back. We will be walking alongside celebrities, artists, diplomats, public officials, world-wide delegations, community leaders and special guests from Israel. And no one group will be more proud than we will be. We will provide buses, snacks, and T-shirts for the nominal price of \$5 per person (see attached). All people eight years old to 80+ can walk – all older and younger can watch and cheer in a designated spot along the parade route.

Connecting to a land far away is difficult for adults, and all the more so for children. We want our students not just to view Israel as a particular accident of geography, but rather as the spiritual resource and focal point for us as Jews. What better way to emphasize the message than by experiencing Israel with all the senses: hear the folk music, see the colors of blue and white on display, taste traditional foods, feel the flags in our hands, smell the spring flowers that will grace the parade route. Looking back on 60 years, six wars and two *intafadas*, it seems incredible that in this short period of time fraught with difficulties we have made the desert bloom, the country grow in every facet of life, the history come alive through tourism and exploration (<http://www.salutetoisrael.org/about>).

But we don't *only* need your presence; we really need your help. We are planning our “Prop Prep” sessions on three separate days to enable students, families and youth group members to participate in making this a spectacular event.

### ISRAEL SCHOLARSHIP INFORMATION

The Education Committee believes it is important that our Jewish teenagers have the opportunity to experience a trip to Israel. A trip to Israel is one of the best ways for teens to explore their Jewish heritage, strengthen their Jewish identity, and make a permanent connection to Judaism.

We would like to remind the congregation about the Israel Scholarship Fund. The money that accumulates in this fund is used to provide financial support to any of our Confirmands who participate in an approved youth trip to Israel. Contributions to the Israel Scholarship Fund can be for any amount, and are a wonderful way to remember a birthday, graduation, Bar/Bat Mitzvah, Confirmation, or any other special occasion.

#### ***Who is eligible for an Israel Scholarship?***

Any Confirmand, up through and including the summer after 12<sup>th</sup> grade, can receive assistance from the Israel Scholarship Fund. The scholarship is not need-based; it is a merit scholarship awarded to any student who has been confirmed and is going on an approved youth trip to Israel.

#### ***When should you make your request for a scholarship?***

A minimum of two months before the student's departure to Israel, a request should be made in writing to the Education Committee. Please provide documentation of the student's enrollment in an Israel trip program.

#### ***How much money is awarded?***

Money in the Israel Scholarship Fund will be equally divided among all eligible students traveling to Israel that year. The amount of money will not exceed \$1,000 per student. The amount given to each student is based on the amount of money in the fund as of May 31 and will be distributed in June.

The Education Committee looks forward to the time when many of our Confirmands travel to Israel with the help of the Israel Scholarship Fund. We appreciate the congregation's generosity in considering the Israel Scholarship Fund when making a donation to the temple.

## KEEPING YOU INFORMED

The Social Action Committee believes that the content of this column is important and timely information of which our congregants should be made aware. We bring it to your attention in the hope of garnering your support to continue to make our world a safer, healthier and more peaceful place in which to live. ### **Malaria**

Malaria is a disease caused by a blood parasite which is transmitted by mosquitoes. Infected humans experience flu-like symptoms that can result in coma and death. Malaria infects more than 500 million people a year and kills more than a million. One person dies about every 30 seconds. The disease is particularly devastating in Africa, where it is a leading killer of children. In addition to being home to the deadliest strain of malaria and the mosquito best equipped to transmit the disease, many areas in Africa lack the proper infrastructure and resources to fight back.

The disease is a self-perpetuating problem with large-scale impact on societies and economies. Malaria accounts for up to half of all hospital admissions and outpatient visits in Africa. In addition to the burden on the health system, malaria illness and death cost Africa approximately \$12 billion a year in lost productivity. The effects permeate almost every sector. Malaria increases school absenteeism, decreases tourism, inhibits foreign investment, and even affects the type of crops that are grown.

### **Malaria is Both Preventable and Treatable**

Malaria is both a preventable and treatable disease. It can be prevented by giving families and individuals insecticide-treated bed nets to sleep under and taking steps to kill mosquitoes where they breed and when they enter houses to feed at night. At the same time, anti-malarial drugs such as artemisinin and other combination therapies that are widely available can treat malaria before it becomes deadly.

Malaria has been brought under control and even eliminated in many parts of Asia, Europe, and the Americas. Yet in Africa, with increasing drug resistance and struggling health systems, malaria infections have actually increased during the last three decades.

### **Bed Nets**

Despite the magnitude of the problem, there is a simple and cost-effective solution to prevent malaria deaths—the purchase and distribution of bed nets. Bed nets work by creating a protective barrier against mosquitoes at night, when the vast majority of transmissions occur. A family of four can sleep under an insecticide-treated bed net, safe from malaria, for up to four years. The benefits of bed nets extend even further than the family. When enough nets are used, the insecticide used to deter mosquitoes makes entire communities safer—including even those individuals who do not have nets.

## Torah Today

*A Brief Summary of Each Week's Torah Portion*

- Shabbat 5/2-3 Parashat Kedoshim, Leviticus 19:1 – 20:27 Summary by Neal Perlman**  
 God gives the Israelites detailed guidelines for moral, ethical and sexual conduct appropriate for living in Israel. God warns them not to conduct themselves in the same manner as the nation God is expelling. God pronounces that just as they are set apart from other peoples, they are to set apart the clean beasts from the unclean.
- Shabbat 5/9-10 Parashat Emor, Leviticus 21:1-24:23 Summary by Elise Kaye**  
 Adonai tells Moses to speak to Aaron's sons, who are the priests. The priests are given instructions regarding the manner in which they must uphold their priestly duties. Chapter 22 discusses the rules governing the sacred donations, which the Israelites consecrate to God. In chapter 23, God instructs Moses to educate the Israelites on the fixed times of sacred occasions, and the manner in which these occasions should be observed. Also discussed, are the various offerings associated with these occasions or events. In chapter 24, Adonai reveals the rules for lighting and kindling lamps regularly. In addition, the philosophy of an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth is emphasized.
- Shabbat 5/16-17 Parashat Behar, Leviticus 25:1 – 26:2 Summary by Linda Cranin**  
 This portion deals with the use of property, both the land and slaves. Adonai speaks to Moses, telling him to instruct the Israelite people on how to keep their land productive by allowing it to rest in the seventh year. The rules for keeping, redeeming and freeing both Israelite and gentile slaves are discussed. Two of the Ten Commandments are discussed: do not make idols, and keep the Sabbath.
- Shabbat 5/23-24 Parashat Behukkotai, Leviticus 26:3 – 27:34 Summary by Neal Finkelstein**  
 God tells the Israelites of the good things that will happen if they observe the commandments. The rains will come, the harvest will be bountiful, there will be peace in the land; but if there should be a war, the Israelites will be victorious. God will dwell amongst the people. On the other hand, if the people do not observe the commandments, God will deal harshly with them and there will be disease, famine, and their enemies will defeat them. If the people remain hostile, God will disperse them among all the nations until such time as they atone. When they atone, God will remember the Covenant made with the patriarchs and will again look with favor on the Israelites.
- The second part of the portion concerns the value of gifts people offer to God. When people experienced good fortune or wanted a favor from God, they promised or vowed themselves, part of their land, or other valuable possession. Rather than giving the promised item, it was permissible to give the monetary equivalent. The second part of the Torah reading deals with the way to determine the monetary value.

 Adonai tells Moses to take a census of the Israelites to determine how many men over the age of 20 could serve in the army. All tribes except the Levites were counted. Adonai told Moses to place the Levites in charge of the Tabernacle. Over 600,000 men were counted.
